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A Great Season

From day one 2010 was shaping up to be one of those years the steelheader only dreams of. The first 3 weeks of the season were undoubtedly "Steelhead Paradise" and the dries and sparsely tied wets were the flies of choice. The Paris Hilton became extremely popular and our inventory became scarce.

Basil's evening catch record log was a lengthy process as a great many fish were being hooked. Many anglers had double digit days and, as I look through the catch records, I am astonished at some of the numbers!

Week 4 turned out to be the best of the season with 269H/185L. Lou Rago went on to have a 12 for 13 day with 10 of them from Dry Fly Diner and mostly on dries and G.L. I am sure that Lou would agree that this day would rarely be repeated and created a wonderful and lasting memory.

I am always surprised at how conditions can change from week to week. Whenever we get a September dusting of snow in the surrounding hills you know it is just a matter of time before we lose the river. And this year was no different. On 25th of September everything changed and conditions were just not the same for several weeks. Week 5 showed an improvement, but by the start of the 6th week conditions again deteriorated and this created a lot of hard work for the results.

Things picked-up again for the remainder of the season and the catch records showed this improvement. The river was slowly dropping and by late October the levels were getting close to early season conditions. The weather was extremely mild for the last part of the season, and this made for some fantastic fishing right to the last day. Week 9 was to be the 3rd best week with over 200 fish hooked!

So 2010 was a season to remember. For some it won't be matched any time soon, and for others it could have been better. All in all we were fortunate to have a significant number of Steelhead in the system and, if not for Mother Nature, we can only wonder at what might have been! For now, it appears as though the Skeena and its tributaries are producing healthy runs. If we can properly manage our commercial fisheries, continue to discourage fish farming off the north coast, and keep a balance of tourism and resource based industry, then we will be able to enjoy the Skeena and its tributaries for many years to come.

Spey Rod Believer – by Rex Lester

Back in 1998 I caught my biggest Steelhead ever. A 27 pound behemoth for the record books that I'll never forget. Twelve years later, 2010 was an exceptional year for me too. The 24.5 pound buck I caught was extra special because it was my first large Steelhead ever landed on my new Spey rod. I have been a holdout for years, comfortably using my 9 ft. traditional rod. But after this year I'm a believer in the advantages of the Spey. I had a blast!

Up to this year, 1998 was my best year in terms of hooked and landed. The water levels in Week 3 this year were similar to 1998. Both years were "Steelhead Magic" to be sure.

I made the decision to get a Spey rod when I saw that the river had changed over the years. In some runs, using the nine foot rod, I just couldn't get the fly out into the seam where the Steelhead were holding. Besides, I have to admit, I was tired of Lani Waller coming in a run behind me, with his Spey rod, and picking up the fish I had missed with my shorter casts.

Also, as I had been told by my fellow Steelheaders, you can cast a Spey rod all day without damage to your rotator-cuff, and other body parts. An important element as we get older! I still used the nine foot rod for dry fly fishing where the seam was closer in.

One afternoon this year, in a little over an hour, Upper Eagle produced eight hook-ups and six landed. Five on a dry fly and three on this years' hot fly, the Paris Hilton. I have never seen anything like it. Steelhead seemed to be behind every rock.

Linus Niedermeyer was fishing the lower half of the run and I

tried to get him to come and fish the upper part. He declined. He told me later it was the opportunity of a lifetime and he did not want to spoil it for me. What a guy!

Linus had his own excitement though while fishing Trotter's Rock that same day. He had a big black bear on the gravel bar right behind where he was fishing. David Holland fired up the boat and ran the bear back into the woods. I'm always looking over my shoulder when fishing and never go out without bear spray. In my 23 years I've never seen a bear come out of the woods and get that close to a fisherman. Unfortunately, everyone was so surprised that no one got a photograph of the bear.


